



35 structural indicators on education policies for the 2018/19 school/academic year in six policy areas: early childhood education and care (ECEC), achievement in basic skills, early leaving from education and training (ELET), higher education, graduate employability and learning mobility.

This year, the report additionally provides a short overview of the major reforms in the said six policy areas since the start of the 2014/15 school/academic year.


Compulsory Education in Europe 2019/20

Looking for concise information on the duration of compulsory education/training in 43 European education systems?


In this new Eurydice's publication, you will definitely find what you're searching for: the duration of compulsory education/training throughout Europe, the starting and leaving ages of pupils in compulsory education. You will discover, for example, that in most European education systems, compulsory education starts at the beginning of primary education, often at the age of 6. However, attending at least the last

year of pre-primary education is compulsory in 16 education systems. France and Hungary report the earliest starting age for compulsory education (3 years old). By contrast, in Estonia, compulsory education starts at the age of 7. In slightly more than half of European education systems, full-time compulsory education/training lasts 10-11 years and ends at the age of 15-16.

The information is available for 43 European education systems covering 38 countries participating in the EU's Erasmus+ programme.

How do countries across Europe organise their education systems? What are the different models of organisation in primary and secondary education in Europe and how long does each educational level last? How diverse are the programmes offered at tertiary level?


The answers to all of these questions can be found in Eurydice's latest publication **The Structure of the European Education Systems**. You will discover, for example, that there are three main organisational models of primary and lower secondary

education in Europe. The report includes a map visually showing these models, national schematic diagrams and a guide to reading the diagrams. The information is available for 43 European education systems, covering 38 countries participating in the EU's Erasmus+ programme.

Teachers' and School Heads' Salaries and Allowances in Europe 2017/18

This report analyses the statutory salaries of teachers and school heads in pre-primary, primary and general secondary public schools in 42 European education systems in 2017/18.

The report shows the main changes in statutory salaries over the last three years and compares the average actual salaries of teachers (including allowances and other additional payments) with the per capita GDP and with the earnings of other tertiary-educated workers.

The report includes national data sheets with extensive information on the salaries, the allowances and other additional payments that teachers and school heads receive. Data have been collected jointly by the Eurydice and the OECD/NESLI networks.
